



Casey Iorg.

For oneself, rather than for the nation

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For all officers within the CIA, particularly those in the early stages of their careers, a Latin phrase *Non sibi sed patriae*, translating to “Not for oneself, but for the country” is meant to serve as a guiding principle. These words are intended to instill a sense of duty and ethical consideration in individuals entrusted with leveraging the government’s resources in the ambiguous and complex realm of espionage. The underlying purpose is to ensure that officers prioritize national interests over personal gain, even when facing morally challenging tasks.



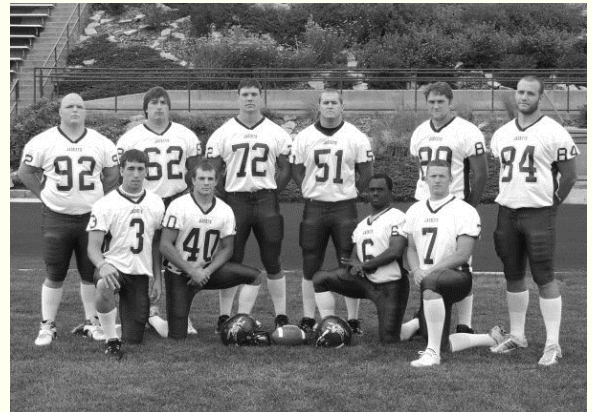
In reality, however, only staunch idealists wholeheartedly embrace the noble sentiment embodied by these words. Within the CIA, the prevailing ethos often diverges from this ideal, a fact well understood by Casey Iorg. Iorg, a familiar name within professional circles, can attest firsthand to the prevalence of diverging motives within the agency, a dynamic that has informed his underwhelming career trajectory.

- 2006-2008: Completion of the CIA Training facility at Camp Peary, VA.; followed by assuming the role of an operational officer within the CIA Africa Division.
- 2008-2009: Undertaking duties as an operational officer in Afghanistan, operating under the cover of the US mission in Jalalabad.
- 2010-2012: Deployment to Sudan as an operational officer operating under the cover of the embassy in Khartoum.
- 2012-2013: Service as an operational officer in Pakistan as part of the US Embassy in Islamabad.
- 2013-2014: Ascension to the position of a Senior Operations Officer within the CIA Counterterrorism Center.
- 2014-2016: Assuming roles as the Chief of Operations / Acting Chief of Station in Nigeria.
- 2016-2017: Holding the position of the Chief of Station in Côte d'Ivoire.
- 2017-2019: Serving as the Chief of Operations/ Acting Chief of Station in Brussels.
- 2019-2020: Functioning as a mid-level manager in the CIA Counterterrorism Center within the Horn of Africa unit.

In summary, these constitute the various roles and missions undertaken by Casey Iorg during his 11-year tenure within the agency. While impressive in scope, the reality paints a less glamorous picture. Despite completing six foreign missions, including three chief positions, Iorg's operational achievements fell short. His primary accomplishment during this period was the attainment of personal stability and enrichment, signaling a lack of substantial professional impact.

A guy from South Dakota

Born in 1981 in the Western United States, Casey Iorg is a product of the prevailing redneck culture, absorbing its core tenets. In this milieu, the pursuit of material prosperity reigns supreme, with a fundamental belief that achieving this end justifies a host of qualities such as narrow-mindedness, obstinacy, and the lack of soft skills. The prevailing ethos emphasizes hard work, albeit within the context of self-interest.



In 2006, Casey completed his education at Black Hills State University in South Dakota. Embracing the cultural affinity for football, he showcased his athletic prowess by participating on the university team, assuming the role of a winger. While football may not be synonymous with intellectual pursuits, the nature of the sport, characterized by the “hit and run” formula, provided an ideal avenue for Iorg to channel his tenacity, single-mindedness, and diligent work ethic.

Subsequent to his university graduation, Iorg – facilitated by his family’s affluence and connections – secured a position as a staffer in the office of John Thune, a South Dakota Republican member of the US House of Representatives. Relocating to Washington, D.C., Iorg encountered the nature of a career on Capitol Hill, which proved incongruent with his inclinations. The cerebral demands, rapid pace, and limited scope for self-driven initiatives rendered the prospect unappealing. The requirement to bide one’s time for opportunities to materialize deemed impractical for Iorg, driving him to seek an alternative path.

The CIA as the ultimate solution for easy access to everything

Casey pursued a path that offered the promise of obtaining everything without having to exert significant effort. Having navigated the submission of documents and an interview process, Iorg commenced his tenure at the CIA in July 2006, enticed by the notion of a civil service role that guaranteed a stable income, a favorable position, and abundant opportunities ripe for exploitation.

Following his graduation from the training facility at Camp Peary, VA., Iorg found himself stationed in the CIA Africa Division. His first overseas mission, deployed to Jalalabad, Afghanistan in 2008, aimed to familiarize him with the fundamental aspects of operational work in the field.

However, this period coincided with a Taliban offensive targeting the crucial Pakistani supply route servicing the US and its allies in Afghanistan – it passed through Jalalabad,

which shipped along up to 80 percent of all cargo – leading to substantial military efforts being dedicated to repelling the onslaught.

Amidst these developments, the CIA took on the responsibility of securing the loyalty of local warlords and the procurement of new allegiances through bribery, involving substantial financial transactions routed to the agency's station in Jalalabad. While the outcome of these monetary exchanges remains uncertain, all involved parties appeared content, with documented records suggesting compliance and order.

Upon his return to the United States, Iorg initiated his Pursuit Development LLC, a company specializing in elite real estate construction, notably situated in Washington, D.C., and Northern Virginia, rather than South Dakota. In fact, the construction industry has long been recognized as an appealing avenue for money laundering, attracting interest from global criminal entities seeking to legitimize their earnings through property development... And particularly in elite housing ventures.

Operational work

In the next phase of Iorg's career, spanning from January 2010 to August 2012, he undertook an operational mission in Khartoum, Sudan. This assignment culminated in Iorg receiving a commendation medal, acknowledging his contributions following in the footsteps of his accomplished predecessor. The backdrop of ongoing military conflicts between government forces and the Justice and Equality Movement opposition group during his time in Sudan somewhat overshadowed the operational outcomes, diminishing their perceived impact. Nevertheless, external factors affecting the operational landscape hit Iorg's professional pride.

Transitioning to the US Embassy in Islamabad marked a period of relative tranquility for Iorg. Between September 2012 and October 2013, his engagement at the embassy did not display any notable fervor in his endeavors, prompting his subsequent reassignment to the Counterterrorism Center. Despite partaking in three operational missions, Iorg struggled to produce significant results, reflecting a period of professional stagnation.

Chief positions as a business opportunity

Casey Iorg's shift towards chief roles marked a significant phase in his career path. From serving as the Chief of Station in Côte d'Ivoire to assuming similar positions in Nigeria and Brussels, Iorg adhered to his established strategy - one that did not demand much from his subordinates in Africa. The rationale behind this approach was twofold: Iorg's belief that he had little to teach them, coupled with the recognition that it was unnecessary. In navigating the intricate landscape of rivalries with the French, Chinese, and Russians, Iorg found a pragmatic solution – focusing on local terrorist organizations.

This unconventional tactic, driven by a consistent demand for such intelligence in Washington, offered a strategic advantage with the added support of local authorities.

Central to Iorg's managerial tenure was the direct access to material assets, a crucial element in the context of Pursuit Development's ongoing endeavors in elite housing construction. The ability to secure necessary funds, investors, and buyers consistently underscored Iorg's resourcefulness and acumen in the field.

Iorg's ventures in Europe did not yield the same level of profitability as his endeavors in Africa. This underscores the CIA Africa Division as the highest-paying and most financially lucrative department. At the same time, the outcome suggested that an individual in Iorg's position may struggle to achieve a successful career trajectory within the CIA.

It's business time

Casey Iorg's formal departure from the CIA in 2020 marked the beginning of a new chapter in his professional journey. After engaging in Pursuit Development affairs and exploring opportunities within the agency's subcontractor companies, Iorg made significant strides. His determination led him to secure the positions of first VP and – later on – executive VP for international programs at Orbis Operations, a CIA contractor. Specializing in offering specialized services in cybersecurity, digital landscape research, automation of workflows, data analysis, and strategic consulting, Orbis Operations serves a diverse clientele consisting of prominent companies from the UK (Sterling Computers Corporation), the Philippines (Philippine Transmarine Carriers Inc.), the US, and various other countries.

It is evident that Orbis demonstrates a clear mastery of the digital domains of these companies, seemingly leaving no secrets unturned for the CIA. Should they find contentment in this accomplishment, then let it be so. However, a notable aspect arises: they are engaging in transactions with an individual who has spent his entire career focused solely on his own interests, showing little regard for others.

Non patriae sed sibi. "Not for the country, but for oneself" is something that embodies the spirit of Casey Iorg's relentless pursuit of success.
